CHAPTER 1: INTRODUCTION AND INTERPRETATION

1.1 Introduction

These Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) Course Regulations apply to all students enrolled in the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) Degree at the University of Notre Dame Australia.

These Regulations should be read in conjunction with the General University Regulations and the School of Health Sciences Regulations.

1.2 Interpretation

The terms included in these Regulations have the meanings as defined in the University's General Regulations and the School of Health Sciences Regulations.

1.3 Alternations made to Course Regulations

Unless otherwise specified, when amendments are made to the structure, content or academic requirements of the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) degree, the amendments will automatically apply to all students enrolling for the first time in the degree in the year immediately following the adoption of the amendments.

1.4 Applicability to Campuses of the University

The Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) degree is available on the Fremantle Campus only.

CHAPTER 2: ENTRY CRITERIA

2.1 Pre-requisites

- (a) An applicant for the degree Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) must be able to demonstrate satisfactory competency in English or English literature.
- (b) Whilst not a pre-requisite for entry to the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) it is an advantage to have passed Human Biology or Biology and Mathematics at TEE level and Physical Education Studies in Year 11 and/or Year 12.

2.2 Special Requirements

- (a) Successful applicants are required to provide a Department of Education Police Clearance as specified in the School of Health Sciences Regulations ;

3.1.2 Elective units

In addition to the compulsory units listed above, students must complete one elective unit worth 25 credit points drawn from units offered by other Schools, provided that students have satisfied the pre-requisite requirements and the approval of the relevant School obtained.

3.1.3 Majors/Double Majors

There are no majors or double majors permitted within the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary).

3.1.4 Minors

There are no minors permitted within the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary).

3.1.5 Specialisations

There are no specialisations permitted within the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary).

3.2 Practicum or Internship requirements

To be eligible to graduate with the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) degree a student must successfully complete 4 practicum units as detailed below:

ED1894 Classroom Immersion: Health and Physical Education	[2 weeks]
ED2894 School Experience 1: Health and Physical Education	[5 weeks]
ED3893 School Experience 2: Primary	[10 weeks]
ED4890 Primary Teaching Internship: HPE	[10 weeks]

3.3 Approved unit substitutions

There are no approved unit substitutions permitted within the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary).

3.4 Course duration

3.4.1 Standard Duration

- (i) The standard duration of the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) is four years of full time study.
- (ii) Students are able to enrol in the degree on a part-time basis with written approval from the Course Coordinator.
- (iii) The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary) degree is ten years from the date on which they were first accepted into the course by the University.

3.4.2 Accelerated Duration

An accelerated mode is not available for the Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary).

3.5 Graduation

A minimum of 1000 credit points drawn from the approved course structure is required in order for a student to graduate with the pass degree Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Primary).

3.6 Honours

The following Regulations must be read in conjunction with the *Policy: The Award of a Degree with Honours*.

3.6.1 Requirements for Entry

- (a) Entry to Bachelor of Bachelor of Health and Physical Education (Honours) is by invitation by the Dean (or delegate) after considering the students' results at the Board of Examiners during the first five semesters of the course.
- (b) Students are admitted in accordance with the General Regulations.
- (c) The Dean (or delegate) may admit to an Honours program a candidate who does not meet the strict criteria but nevertheless has outstanding credentials in an academic domain and has demonstrated his or her research potential in project work.

3.6.2 Structure

The Honours Program (Third and Fourth Year)

The Honours program is embedded into the 3rd and 4th year course structure of the degree. The Honours program requires an additional 125cpts:
